Archaeology Scotland

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

Introduction to archaeology! Participants will excavate a dig pit, plan the finds, record the finds and then discuss what they have found. They will uncover the story of their excavation and think about how archaeologists make discoveries and what they mean.

Bonaly Scout Centre

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

We are running a series of team games based around communication skills. Our sessions will start with a short introduction and practical exercise followed by three activities:

- 1) Robot Retrieval
 - Direct the blindfolded robot through a maze to retrieve an object, the team member giving instructions to the robot cannot see the maze.
- 2) Counting Cones

Take turns negotiating the cone course in the correct order, with one team member stationed inside the cone course and the other outside. The Team member outside the cone course holds the map and gives directions.

3) Battleships

The battleships are controlled by the captains. The aim is to intercept and sink the battleships of the opposing teams

At the end of the session we will review the activities and conclude with a final exercise which will, hopefully demonstrate improved awareness of communication.

Dynamic Earth

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

At Dynamic Erath we are passionate about outdoor learning and keen to show that it doesn't have to be difficult, or require lots of kit! Our stalls will be using simple skills such as observing, drawing and measuring to tell a wider story about the environment around us.

One of our stalls will be investigating amazing trees around us! We are using maths to get to know the trees in Holyrood Park to find out how much carbon they are storing away! Choose your own tree, take some measurements and calculate how well your tree is fighting climate change. This is a great activity which just requires a measuring tape and calculator to run, as well as a bit of brain power!

Our second stall will be focusing on the weather. Environmental scientists must be good at making observations about the world around us, so we will be practising this skill by interpreting the clouds and predicting the weather for the day. We will also make a cloud appear before your eyes in our 'Cloud in a bottle' Demo.

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

Mixing art and nature, this activity will teach children how to be creative using natural materials they find around them. In pairs, using rope and small pieces of wood found on the ground, they will learn how to tie a few knots to create a wooden picture frame. They will then collect other natural materials such as dead leaves, daisies or snail shells to put in their frame and create a wild art painting. Children will then go around and visit other pupils' artwork to see what they came up with and to give them more ideas for next time.

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

We'll be making Tree Cookies! This is a simple crafting activity that can be carried out in school grounds using natural materials. It also teaches children to use handtools in a safe and responsible way, including bow saws and hand drills. All you need is a length of fairly straight wood, a saw horse, a bow saw and a hand drill.

The children cut a small section of wood, creating a thin disc that hand then be drilled and decorated using felt pens or other crafting materials. Previous examples have been decorated with tree names and used as tree tags in woodlands.

Gorgie City Farm

About:

Gorgie City Farm will take part in the Twilight session only. We strongly encourage teachers to bring their classes to visit our small urban farm, situated just west of Haymarket station. In this urban setting you can enjoy a mini-break to the countryside! As a working farm, we have cows, sheep, pigs, chickens, ducks, some ridiculously cute baby goats as well as lots of pets. We have a beautiful vegetable garden which at this time of year is overflowing with delicious produce to harvest: courgettes, lettuce, kale, celery, raspberries, pears, plums, apples, tomatoes, potatoes etc.

We can offer the following to enhance your learning experience on the farm:

- Seasonal tours: Food and farming: meet, feed and handle farm animals and pets; Harvest: harvest produce from our garden, prepare and taste it; New Life: meet baby farm animals and talk about new life in plants and wildlife
- Seasonal workshops: Butter making/ Harvest: harvest wheat, grind it into flour and make flatbread/ Ready steady grow! – planting and gardening/ Get Dirty: farm work
- Cuddle corners: pet handling session get up close to our reptiles and furry friends
- Once upon a farm: farm activities based around well-loved stories

PGDE Geography Group 1 Activity

A fun team-based activity exploring weather and climate within two contrasting regions, and looking at why plant and animal species are suitable for living in these regions. These activities will get pupils moving around and interacting with one another to explore the differences between the weather and climate in Scotland and Kenya and how plants and animals have adapted in response.

PGDE Geography Group 2 Activity

This interactive workshop considers sea level rise and the implications and challenges of reduced resources for people living in affected areas. Pupils will be guided through a role play scenario as islanders affected by sea level rise. They will have to make decisions based on the encroaching sea and cope with the consequences...

PGDE Geography Group 3 Activity:

The aim of the activity is to allow the pupils to engage with concepts of understanding the 8 point compass and using a compass for simple navigation. Pupils will follow directions using a compass to discover the answers to questions on sustainability.

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

Alchemy, Creativity and the Outdoors: Drawing with Plants; Painting with Nature

STEAM Curriculum: Expressive Arts, Botany, Chemistry in the Outdoors

Outcome: Participants will be invited to create a colour spectrum of Natural Plant shades in their Sketchbook journal which will explore topics for the STEAM curriculum.

Drawing with natural pigments encourages you to play with colours, to discover plants and learn what their names are, so you can use them again in the future. You can select flowers and their leaves; from tree leaves and berries at certain times of year, to mosses and lichens when they are moist, to soils and clays. You have a wide palette around you, you just need to have a go and see what happens!

We'll take our sketchbooks for a walk and see how many colours from the natural world we can make together with some wee surprises thrown in too.



Science Ceilidh

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

Our session will be exploring sustainability and the water cycle through interdisciplinary learning including movement, creativity and other STEM topics. Once the water cycle, and how this is affected by climate change locally and globally by climate change, is covered, learners work together to develop their own dance movements to embody this learning. Depending on time, they will be able to make their own instruments, including with outdoor and recycled materials, to develop their own soundscapes for their creative piece and learn about the physics of sound too.

Scottish Orienteering

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

Scottish Orienteering, with the support of Edinburgh Southern Orienteering Club, will be offering 2 different activities to introduce orienteering. At one of our stations, we will have a clock relay challenge using orienteering maps of part of Holyrood Park. Pairs will work together undertaking a fun challenge to learn how to correctly locate features on the map, place markers and race round a course. At our other stations, there will be a maze orienteering challenge. Using a specially constructed maze in the park, pupils will learn how to read and set an orienteering map to complete courses within the maze. Keeping the map set (pointing in the correct direction) is one of the most important skills in orienteering and mazes are a great fun way of learning this. Pairs will need to read courses marked on the maps to determine which points in the maze to visit, whilst learning the basic skills of orienteering. Electronic timing will be used to check that they visit the correct locations and to determine who is fastest. However, remember for either exercise accuracy is just as important as speed!

Orienteering can be easily introduced within the gym hall and playground using simple games and exercises before venturing out into local areas. Scottish Orienteering also offers an Introducing Orienteering (IntrO) course for teachers, youth leaders, outdoor centre instructors and anyone interested in introducing orienteering to young people. The course is an enjoyable, active learning experience and also provides a full set of further resources that you can use immediately for a series of progressive sessions.

On the course you will learn how to introduce the basic skills of orienteering through indoor and outdoor activities, and how to bring a variety of subjects to life through the medium of orienteering. As well as offering the incentive for significant physical activity, orienteering offers some important life skills and links with many areas of the curriculum.

The full course can be delivered as a single 6-hour day, or can be split it into shorter sessions if that suits your requirements better. We can offer tailored courses especially for your school as well as regularly running general courses in Edinburgh. We can often support the costs of courses through development funding, resulting in a cost of only £15 per person to attend. Sustrans

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

Sustrans' Big Street Survey is a free curriculum resource enabling pupils to investigate the area around their school and create a manifesto on how to make their streets safer and greener.

Working both inside and outside the classroom, pupils explore what they like and dislike about their neighbourhood, before using their manifesto to lobby decision-makers and elected representatives at national and local levels to make their changes happen.

We use the Big Street Survey as both a tool for empowering pupils to engage with decision-makers, as well as providing valuable information for infrastructure developments around schools.

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

The activity is learning about fire lighting in a safe manner using flint and steel. We will discuss the purpose of a fire e.g cooking, boiling water, heat. We will also discuss how to keep safe around a fire, what behaviour is appropriate and what behaviour is not appropriate. Each child will have the opportunity to try out using a flint and steel and the group will light a fire in a Kelly kettle. Once the Kelly kettle has been lit, the group will keep the fire going until the water has boiled. Hot chocolate will be made from the boiled water and drunk while listening to a story.

Wildside Nature

Outdoor Learning Challenge Activity:

We will be examining a number of skulls and bones from a wide variety of different species of animals. The classes will work in small groups of 3/4 pupils and examine each skull trying to decide what species they think it was from in around 5 minutes before then moving onto the next skull. Once every group has examined every skull we will discuss what species they thought they came from and what species they actually came from and how they are adapted for this species way of life.

We will then look at one skull, that of a beaver, and will also let the pupils touch and feel a beaver pelt. We will discuss how this species became extinct in UK but has been recently reintroduced. We will discuss their lodge and dam building behaviour, and how this can have a positive impact on other species and environments. The pupils will then work in pairs to make their own mini dam using sticks, leaves and other natural materials within plastic trays I will provide. After a given time they will all stop and we will test which one can hold water back for the longest when trays are tilted and water poured in the top of them.
